

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Dear Colleagues,

It is our great pleasure to inform you that the 10th International Symposium on Mechanisms of Vasodilatation is to take place in Matsushima, Miyagi, Japan on Monday June 1st to Wednesday June 3rd, 2009.

The symposia on "Mechanisms of Vasodilatation" have established themselves over the years as the premiere event where vascular biologists from all over the world get together to report and discuss their most exciting research related to the control of vascular tone. The topics covered have included nervous control, the function of vascular smooth muscle and the role played by endothelium-derived vasoactive factors. This tradition will be continued in Matsushima. But the meeting will address other important potential regulatory factors, in particular those generated in the adventitia of the vascular wall. Except for the Named Lectures, and one thematic session, the program will be constructed solely with the submitted abstracts, to be presented as oral communications and/or poster presentations.

June is the best season to visit Matsushima, one of the three most famous scenic locations in Japan. Matsushima, which means "Pine Islands", consists of about 260 islands, covered with pine trees, located in the Bay of Matsushima. The harmony between islands and sea results in a breathtaking beauty. It is said that even Matsuo Basho, one of the most famous haiku poets in Japan, could not compose good haiku when seeing the site, overwhelmed as he was by its beauty. We sincerely hope that during your stay in Japan you will enjoy the traditional Japanese culture, nature, and, most importantly, the science of MOVD.

We are looking forward to welcoming you in Matsushima in June 2009.

Named Lectures



7th John T. Shepherd Lecture on Nervous Control Michael J. Joyner (Mayo. Clinic, USA)

Michael J. Joyner, M.D., is Professor of Anesthesiology at the Mayo Clinic where he also serves as Deputy Director and Associate Dean for Research. Dr. Joyner's research interests focus on cardiovascular control in conscious humans and he is especially interested in the interaction between local vasodilator signals and sympathetic vasoconstriction.



6th Robert F. Furchgott Lecture on Endothelium Kim Dora (Univ. of Oxford, UK)

Her research interest is Endothelium-dependent intercellular communication in resistance arteries.



5th David F. Bohr Lecture on Vascular Smooth Muscle Mark Nelson (Univ. of Vermont, USA)

Mark Nelson, Ph.D., professor and chair of pharmacology at the University of Vermont College of Medicine, his research is urinary disorders, such as overactive bladder and incontinence, as well as for additional investigation on the underlying causes and potential therapies for erectile dysfunction.



4th Björn Folkow Lecture on Growth and Remodeling Peter Libby (Harvard Univ., USA)

Dr. Libby's current major research focus is the role of inflammation in vascular diseases such as atherosclerosis. He has received numerous awards and recognitions for his research accomplishments. His areas of clinical expertise include general and preventive cardiology.



3rd Paul M. Vanhoutte Lecture on Vascular Pathophysiology Thomas F. Lüscher (Univ. of Zurich, Switzerland)

Lüscher's research interests focus on the role of endothelium-derived mediators in the regulation of vascular tone, platelet-vessel wall interaction, and coagulation as well as vascular structure in aging, hypertension, hyperlipidemia, and atherosclerosis.

General Information for Submitting Abstracts

Abstracts will be accepted for oral or poster presentations. Also in some of the symposia, the committee will pick some oral presentations from the submitted abstracts. The committee of the 10th MOVD will vet for acceptance all submitted abstracts. The authors of accepted abstracts will be notified by e-mail by March 2009. The presenting author must register for the symposium during the period of pre-registration.

Format for Writing Abstract(s)

The abstract should be written in English.

Use standard abbreviations and place all special or unusual abbreviations in parentheses after the first use of the full word. Use generic names of drugs. Write numbers as numerals rather than words.

The title of the paper should be in CAPITALS. Single spacing is also required (20 words).

The text of the abstract should cover the purpose of introduction/background, methods, results and conclusions (250 words).

- 2. An applicant must be a top author of an abstract and select 'Free paper (Oral)' when submitting the abstract online.
- 3. The applicants must go through the application procedure for registration for the symposium and complete the payment.
- 4. It is the applicant's responsibility to obtain the necessary visa for entering Japan prior to the congress.

The 5 finalists must present their paper at the YIA competition finalist session. The most excellent awardees will receive a grant of JPY 200,000- and the other awardees (4 persons) will receive a grant of JPY 100,000-.







Matsushima

Zuiganji Temple

Zuiganji Temple was built by Lord Date Masamune. The main hall was built in the traditional study room style of architecture known as shoinzukuri.

Theroof of its magnificent, single-story main structure is tiled in the hongawarabuki style in which round and square tiles are laid down alternately. Many parts of the temple have been designated as national treasures or important cultural properties. The main hall,





This temple, said to be Matsushima's oldest remaining Momoyama period structure, was rebuilt by Date Masamune in 1604. A Buddhist structure, it was built in the hosangen style using a total of twelve columns and a pyramidal roof tiled in the hongawarabuki style in which round and square tiles are put down in an alternating pattern. The hall is designated as a property of national cultural importance.



Sendai

Ruins of Sendai Castle

Date Masamune constructed this castle in 1603, and it was a residence for several generations of the Date family. There was no tower. The castle was destroyed after the Meiji Restoration, but the big steel gates that were moved from Hizen Nagoya Castle and Sumiyagura were kept.



However, they were burned down in an air raid in 1945. This area has a park today, Gokoku Shrine, a monument to Bansui Doi's Kojo-no-Tsuki, a Toson Shimazaki poem monument, the Akitada monument, and a statue of Date Masamune riding a horse stand where the main area used to be.



Date Masamune (1567-1636) His warrior name was Dokuganryu (one-eyed dragon), and he controlled the Ou region. In 1591 he was ordered by Hideyoshi Toyotomi to move from Dewa Yonezawa to Mutsu. He established a base at Tamatsukuri-gun lwadeyama and began constructing a new castle in Sendai in 1600.

Jozenji-dori Avenue

Jozenji-dori is a valley of buildings with a long strip of greenery running through the middle. It most reflects the image of "Mori-no-Miyako"-the City of Trees-. Under the thick Zelkova trees, you will see sunlight filtering down onto



the walk ways. On a hot day, many people stop by to seek shelter under the green shade.

Zao

In the southern part of Sendai, near the border of Fukushima Prefecture, lies the stately Zao Mountaion Range. The Zao Range stretches between Miyagi and Yamagata prefectures with its foothills reaching out into the countryside. From the summit of Mt. Katta, which is



situated at the center of the range, you can experience a fascinating view of the emerald-green crater lake Okama, a symbol of Zao. Various resort facilities such as skiing areas, hot springs, and ranches offer a wide range of attractions year-round. A rich, fulfilling experience is yours as you savor the timeless beauty of the Zao.

Yamadera

This ancient temple was founded in 860 AD by Ennin, a monk of the Tendai sect of Buddhism. Yamadera simply means "mountain temple," although its proper name is Hojusanrishaku-ji. This temple is one of the most significant sacred sites in the Northeastern



Tohoku region of Japan, capturing the attention of an enormous number of the faithful. It is said that earthly desires blocking you from enlightenment begin to fade away with each step you take up the 1,015 stone stairs on the trek from the foot of the mountain to the temple itself. At the end of the stone stairs is the Godai-dou, known to have the best view in Yamadera. The view from Godai-dou will make you forget your weary feet.
